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THE THREE LITTLE PIGS A Choral Speaking Re-telling in Rhyme

VOCABULARY LIST:

manure: n. material that fertilizes land; *especially* refuse of stables and barnyards

forevermore: adv. forever

mortar: n. material used in building construction to bond brick, stone, tile, or concrete blocks into a structure

countryside: n. a rural area

culinary: adj. of or relating to the kitchen or cookery

bricks: n. a handy-sized unit of building or paving material typically being rectangular

To find the proper rhythm, first read-aloud and clap through the piece as you go. Each underlined word or word part falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady. Be careful not to read too fast! This is a rehearsal technique and readers will not clap throughout the entire piece during performance. NOTE: There are a few times during the performance when readers do clap and these are clearly indicated below. Example: (clap, clap)

In this piece there are solo lines for 6 solo speakers. These readers should be positioned, in speaking order, in the front row of the choir or featured down stage and off to one side, facing audience. NOTE: You can stretch the solo speakers to 12 by assigning the second set of solo lines to 6 additional speakers.

(TEACHER/DIRECTOR faces audience for his/her line then turns to direct choir on the first claps):

TEACHER/DIRECTOR: I know a pig.

(clap clap)

ALL SPEAKERS: We know a pig.

(clap clap)

ALL GIRLS: You could call him <u>little</u>

ALL BOYS: Since he <u>is</u>n't very <u>biq.</u>

ALL SPEAKERS: He <u>built</u> a small <u>house</u>

Of <u>straw</u> and man<u>u</u>re.

It cost five pennies,

Or maybe even fewer.

(Turn to deliver this line to audience, but continue directing. Once line is delivered, you may quickly turn back to choir).

TEAHCER/DIRECTOR: Then he <u>said</u>,

ALL SPEAKERS/

CHORUS: "Hey Wolf

Stay away from my door.

This house will keep me safe

Forevermore.

(clap clap)

And if it doesn't,

One way or the other,

I can <u>al</u>ways go and <u>live</u>

With my **brother**!"

(Same as above)

TEACHER/DIRECTOR: I know a piq.

(clap clap)

ALL SPEAKERS: We know a pig.

(clap clap)

ALL GIRLS: You could call her <u>li</u>ttle

ALL BOYS: Since she <u>is</u>n't very <u>big.</u>

ALL SPEAKERS: She <u>built</u> a tall <u>house</u>

Of mud and sticks.

Paid ten thin dimes

For the twiqgy-mud mix.

(Same as above)

TEACHER/DIRECTOR: Then she <u>said</u>,

ALL SPEAKERS/

CHORUS: "Hey Wolf

Stay away from my door.

This <u>house</u> will keep me <u>safe</u>

Forevermore.

(clap clap)

And if it doesn't,

One way or the other,

I can <u>al</u>ways go and <u>live</u>

With my **brother**!"

(Same as above)

TEACHER/DIRECTOR: I know a pig.

(clap clap)

ALL SPEAKERS: We know a pig.

(clap clap)

ALL GIRLS: You could call him little

ALL BOYS: Since he <u>is</u>n't very <u>biq.</u>

ALL SPEAKERS: He <u>built</u> a wide <u>house</u>

Of <u>bricks</u> and <u>mor</u>tar.

The whole darn thing

Cost a dollar and a quarter.

(Same as above)

TEACHER/DIRECTOR: Then he <u>said</u>,

ALL SPEAKERS/

CHORUS: "Hey Wolf

Stay away from my door.

This house will keep me safe

Forevermore.

(clap clap)

And if it doesn't,

One way or the other,

I <u>quess</u> I'll go and <u>live</u>

With my mother!"

(clap clap)

SOLO SPEAKER 1: Then the <u>wolf</u>, big and <u>bad</u>,

Appeared on the scene.

He wasn't very friendly.

In <u>fact</u>, he was <u>mean</u>.

SOLO SPEAKER 2: He <u>huffed</u> and he <u>puffed</u>

From town to town.

'Till he <u>huffered</u> and he <u>puffered</u>

Everything down.

SOLO SPEAKER 3: He <u>blew</u> the straw <u>house</u>

Through the clouds on high.

Then <u>blew</u> the stick <u>house</u>
