A TORTOISE, OF COURSE

Written and formatted for Choral Speaking
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(To Find the Proper Rhythm: First read-aloud and clap through the piece as you read. Each underlined word or word part falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady (except for the occasional spot where the rhythm is temporarily abandoned). Be careful not to read too fast! This is a rehearsal technique and speakers will not clap throughout the entire piece during performance.

NOTE: Remember that a choral speaking "voice choir" must seem to speak in one voice. Please rehearse your speakers to speak and breath together and in unison. This piece should move along like a flowing river (as most poems probably should) but also convey a sense of lightheartedness and fun.

Voice Choir Positions: Place girls together on one side of the stage or risers, boys together on the other. Place them beside each other and angle them in such a way that they are slightly facing one another. Solo speakers may be positioned in a line down front and/or slightly to the side of the choir).

(Quick breath)

Front legs flat, back legs like towers

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SOLO SPEAKER 2: See?

(Pause)

What can it be?

MALE SPEAKERS: <u>It's</u> a tortoise, <u>tort</u>oise, of course

FEMALE SPEAKERS: Of <u>course</u> a tortoise, it <u>isn't</u> horse

SOLO SPEAKER 2: And <u>right</u> on course, a <u>desert</u> force

ALL SPEAKERS: <u>Is</u> the tortoise, of <u>course</u>

What's that moving on the land Wearing a dome of brownish tan

(Large quick breath)

<u>Finding</u> a water pool, <u>testing</u> the rim <u>Wanting</u> a drink, not <u>wanting</u> a swim

(Quick breath)

Before the sunlight begins to dim
