ALL: Maybe this way? Maybe that way?

Maybe up, maybe down,

Maybe on the road to town?

We want to know!

ALL: (clap, <u>clap</u>)

ALL BOY VOICES: But <u>mas</u>ter wouldn't <u>tell</u> them,

North, West, East, or South,

No words of instruction

Would be <u>coming</u> from *his* <u>mouth</u>.

ALL GIRL VOICES: For once that information

Was <u>out</u> and brought <u>forth</u>,

It <u>would</u>n't take much <u>time</u>

For his <u>slaves</u> to head <u>north</u>.

ALL BOY VOICES: Which way is <u>north</u>?

ALL: (clap, <u>clap</u>)

ALL GIRL VOICES: Ask <u>Joe</u>, ASK <u>JOE</u>!

ALL BOY VOICES: Which way is <u>north</u>?

ALL GIRL VOICES: Will he know? Will he know?

Maybe up, maybe down,

JOE WILL KNOW!

(Teacher's note: In winter and early spring, the angle of the sun above the horizon at noon

gets higher each day. Quail are the migratory

birds that winter in the South)

ALL: <u>Follow (clap)</u>

The <u>drinking gourd</u>.

Follow (clap)

The drinking gourd.

<u>List</u>en to the <u>old</u> man

And follow if you can.

ALL BOY VOICES: Follow the signs

A<u>long</u> the Tom<u>big</u>bee, <u>Hike</u> across the <u>hills</u> To the <u>Ten</u>nes<u>see</u>.

(Teacher's note: The Tombigbee, The Tennessee, and The Ohio all refer to rivers the slaves had to follow and/or cross to find freedom in the north. The slaves were told to look for "signs" or drawings on dead branches along the Tombigbee. Finding and following the signs, meant they were headed in the right direction. These drawings were of a left foot and a peg foot and related directly to Peg Leg Joe).

ALL GIRL VOICES: Left foot, peg foot,

Can't be ignored

When you follow, follow follow

The <u>drinking gourd</u>.

ALL: Follow (clap)

The <u>drinking gourd</u>.

ALL BOY VOICES: Months will pass

From cold, rain, and sunshine

All the way back to snow.

(**Teacher's note:** It usually took a year to make the trip north from the Deep South. The Underground Railroad folks knew this and wanted the slaves to reach the Ohio River when it would be frozen and easy to cross. So they would arrive there at the right time, the slaves were told to start their journey in the winter a year earlier).

ALL GIRL VOICES: Cross the frozen Ohio

Like an icy road,

Then you've <u>found</u> your way to <u>free</u>dom

All because of this code.

(**Teacher's note:** In winter and early spring, the angle of the sun above the horizon at noon
