## **Have Fun With English**

**VOICE CHOIR FORMATTING:** ALL, ALL FEMALE VOICES, ALL MALE VOICES, ONE HALF OF CHORUS, OTHER HALF OF CHORUS, and one line for ALL VOICES IN THE FRONT ROW.

## **ESTABLISHING THE RHYTHM:**

To find the proper beat or rhythm for this script, first read-aloud and clap through the sections as you go. Each *underlined word or word part* falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady. Be careful not to read too fast! This is a rehearsal technique and readers will not clap throughout the reading during performance. Once your readers feel comfortable with the beat and pace, it's time to interpret, improvise, experiment, and have fun with the piece.

ALL:

Have fun with English!

(Or Have fun with Reading!)

Make your voices heard.

Ringing voices, all in chorus

Speaking English words.

Experiment with English!

(Or Experiment with Reading!)

Play with what you say.

Since English isn't easy

(Or Reading isn't always easy)

Have some fun along the way!

**ALL VOICES IN** 

**THE FRONT ROW:** For example:

**ALL FEMALE VOICES:** We can speak out <u>loud</u>ly

(Spoken very loudly):

**ALL MALE VOICES:** SPEAK THOSE WORDS OUT LOUD!

**ALL FEMALE VOICES:** Stop!

<u>Speaking</u> out that <u>loud</u>ly Just <u>should</u>n't be a<u>llowed</u>.

**ALL:** And we can speak out softly,

Or whisper in your ear.

(Half of the chorus members

turn and whisper in each

other's ears).

OTHER HALF OF CHORUS: No!

When you speak that softly

No one else can hear.

**ALL MALE VOICES:** We can speak quite <u>rapid</u>ly,

## (Spoken very fast):

**ALL FEMALE VOICES:** <u>Just like a speeding train.</u>

**ALL MALE VOICES:** Or <u>say</u> the words quite <u>slow</u>ly,

(Spoken slowly):

**ALL:** Just - <u>like</u> - a - clogged - up -

<u>drain</u>.

**ALL:** 

Have fun with English!

(Or <u>Have</u> fun with <u>Read</u>ing!)

Make your voices heard.

Ringing voices, all in chorus

Speaking English words.

Experiment with English!

(Or Experiment with Reading!)

<u>Play</u> with what you <u>say</u>.

Since <u>Eng</u>lish isn't <u>easy</u>

(Or Reading <u>is</u>n't always <u>eas</u>y)

Have some <u>fun</u> along the <u>way!</u>

**HALF THE FEMALE VOCIES:** And when the mood is right,

## (Spoken in a high pitch)

OTHER HALF FEMALE VOICES: We'll speak up high!

(Spoken in a very low pitch and

slow tempo down):

**ALL MALE VOICES:** Or  $-\underline{oh} - \underline{so} - \underline{low}$ ...

(Speak the above slowly and

draw out the word "low":

loooooooooow).

**ALL FEMALE VOICES:** Or <u>wa</u>ter every <u>word</u> and

(Make the words below "grow" by starting the phrase at a low pitch, then building higher and louder as each word is spoken):

ALL: watch them grow!

(Speak the following words at a

waltz tempo:

1,2,3/1,2,3/dance. Example:

"Or say the (2 beats for words)

in (1 beat for such a (2 beats

for way you (1 beat for want) to dance!).

(NOTE: If the above timing is too difficult for your readers, ask them to "bounce" the words as they say them and also bounce their bodies from side to side to indicate dance/movement).

**ALL MALE VOICES:** Or say the **words** 

In such a **way** 

You want to **dance!** 

(For the following, voices should flow like the softly blowing wind described below):

**ALL FEMALE VOICES:** Then softly <u>blow</u>

Just like the winds of

True romance.

(Below is the section devoted to onomatopoeia. It introduces words that, when spoken aloud, sound like their meaning. For example: the word BANG should be spoken so that it sounds like the BANG of a drum!).
