

A Choral Reading Script (With Elements of Readers Theater) for Elementary School Readers

If I Were The Only Person...

NOTE: To read this script, your students must be able to read simple words, phases, and sentences. The text is formatted for **ALL GIRLS**, **ALL BOYS**, and a number of **SOLO READERS**.

NOTE: If needed, older readers (teachers or older students) might take the prose lines that ask the questions requiring a short **ALL** response from the readers. (See below).

The script is flexible and is formatted so that you can use only 8 solo readers to perform all the solo reader lines (just ask them to divide and share the lines that follow below) **or** pencil in additional reader numbers as the script progresses. You can probably give solo reading parts to every student in your class, depending on how you decide to divide the remaining reader lines. (You'll see that reader numbers have been left blank after the initial 8). Please fill them in, according to your class size and needs.

ESTABLISHING THE RHYTHM

To find the proper rhythm for the poetry sections of this script, first read-aloud and clap through the sections as you go. Each underlined word or word part falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady. Be careful not to read too fast! This is a rehearsal technique and readers will not clap throughout these sections during performance.

ALL GIRLS: If I were the only person

Living in this town,

ALL BOYS: I wouldn't need good manners -

Not with <u>no</u> one else a<u>round!</u>

ALL GIRLS: No one else would be close by,

No one else would <u>care</u>.

ALL BOYS: I <u>would</u>n't say "Ex<u>cuse</u> me"

And I wouldn't have to share.

SOLO READER 1: But, <u>no</u>, we're not a<u>lone</u> here.

So the <u>quest</u>ion comes to <u>whether</u>

SOLO READER 2: Good <u>man</u>ners might help <u>ev</u>eryone

READERS 1, 2: <u>Get</u> along together.

ALL: <u>We</u> say, "Thank you", <u>We</u> say, "Please",

Turn away when we sneeze,

Share our crackers, <u>and</u> our cheese,

And we don't bully, fight or tease!

SOLO READER 3: What do you say when someone gives you a

gift?

ALL: Please!

SOLO READER 5: What do you say if you walk in front of

someone?

ALL: Excuse me!

ALL: I'm sorry!

ALL GIRS: If I were the only person

Going to this school,

ALL BOYS: I wouldn't need good manners,

I could <u>act</u> just like a <u>fool</u>!

ALL GIRLS: No one else would bother me,

No one else would dare.

ALL BOYS: I'd <u>nev</u>er ask,"<u>Par</u>don me?"

No one would be there.

SOLO READER 7: But, we have lots of students,

We <u>lis</u>ten when folks <u>talk</u> to us.

Don't <u>push</u> our way on<u>to</u> the bus,

SOLO READER At lunch time, is it good manners to talk with

your mouth full?

ALL: No!

SOLO READER When we play together, is it good manners to

share and be polite to each other?

ALL: Yes!

SOLO READER When you're with your friends, is it good

manners to whisper about classmates who are

near by and hurt their feelings?

ALL: No!
