

A Readers Theater Script (With Elements of Choral Reading) for Elementary School Readers

If I Were The Only Person...

NOTE: To read this script, your students must be able to read simple words, phases, and sentences. For younger grades, older Narrators (teachers or older students) might take the prose lines that ask the questions requiring a short **ALL** response from the readers. The script is flexible and is formatted so that you can use only 6 solo readers to perform the entire script (just ask them to divide and share the lines that follow below) or pencil in additional readers as the script goes along. You can probably give parts to your entire class, depending on how you decide to divide the reader lines. (You'll see that reader numbers have been left blank after the initial 6). Please fill them in, according to your class size and needs.

ESTABLISHING THE RHYTHM

To find the proper rhythm for the poetry sections of this script, first read-aloud and clap through the sections as you go. Each underlined word or word part falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady. Be careful not to read too fast! This is a rehearsal technique and readers will not clap throughout these sections during performance.

READER 1: If I were the only person

Living in this town,

READER 2: I wouldn't need good manners -

Not with no one else around!

READER 3: No one else would be close by,

No one else would care.

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READER 4: I wouldn't say "Excuse me"

And I wouldn't have to share.

READER 5: But, <u>no</u>, I'm not a<u>lone</u> here.

So the <u>question</u> comes to <u>whether</u>...

READER 6: Good <u>man</u>ners might help <u>ev</u>eryone

Get along together.

ALL: We say, "Thank you", We say, "Please",

<u>Turn</u> away <u>when</u> we sneeze,

Share our crackers, and our cheese,

And we don't bully, fight or tease!

READER What do you say when someone gives you a

gift?

ALL: Thank you!

READER And what do you say when you ask for

something?

ALL: Please!

READER What do you say if you walk in front of

someone?

ALL: Excuse me!

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READER And what do you say if you hurt someone?

ALL: I'm sorry!

READER If I were the only person

Going to this school,

READER I <u>would</u>n't need good <u>man</u>ners –

I could <u>act</u> just like a <u>fool</u>.

READER No one else would bother me,

No one else would dare.

READER I'd <u>nev</u>er ask,"<u>Par</u>don me?"

No one would be there.

READER But, we have lots of students,

So the <u>ques</u>tion comes to <u>whether</u>

READER Good <u>man</u>ners might help <u>ev</u>eryone

<u>Get</u> along together.

ALL: We don't argue, we don't cuss,

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READER At lunch time, is it good manners to talk with

your mouth full?

ALL: No!

near by and hurt their feelings?

ALL: No!

READER When you want to say something, is it good

manners to not interrupt and wait until the

person talking is finished?

ALL: Yes!
