READER 1:	All the other oryx in his herd considered this dream totally inappropriate.
READER 2:	Mother said,
READER 3 (MOTHER):	"What's wrong with my little one? Why in the world would he want to be a silly old unicorn? My boy is handsome, clever, and talented - and he has two spectacular horns."
READER 2:	And unicorns, of course, have only
ALL:	ONE HORN.
READER 4:	Then Father said,

- (FATHER): "Mother, you've babied that young one. I hate to say it, but you're turning him into a sissy. There's no such thing as a unicorn anyway. Unicorns are myths. What our son needs is a taste of the *real world!*"
- READER 1: But none of his parents' advice made a difference. The young oryx still didn't dream about being...
- ALL: A green alligator or long-necked geese, Not a humpty backed camel or a chimpanzee, Not a cat, rat or elephant, but sure as you're born He just wanted to be a unicorn.
- READER 2: Now, as rumor had it, there **was** a unicorn living right there in the Kingdom of Unicorn-on-the-cobia. According to the story, a magnificent unicorn lived in the king's palace. This unicorn wore a coat of gold and his single horn was also golden. It sparked in the sunlight.
- READER 3: And **this** unicorn lived in the *real world* because he had a *real* job. He served as the Queen's private coat rack. Whenever the queen took off her royal robe, she hung it on the unicorn's golden horn. She couldn't hang up any other pieces of her clothing because unicorns, of course, have only...

- ALL: ONE HORN.
- READER 4: And that's where this story gets really interesting because, one day, the king and queen of Unicorn-onthe-cobia welcomed an important visitor to the palace.
- READER 5: The visitor was The Grand Duchess of the Kingdom of Uni-cornucopia. And as with all Cornucopians, she brought with her an abundance of everything. That means - she had a lot of stuff!
- READER 1: The queen wanted to make their guest feel at home, and so she made arrangements to have her beautiful golden unicorn coat rack led to the bedroom of The Grand Duchess. But when the duchess saw the coat rack, she was not pleased. She cried:
