PROPS AND COSTUMES

PROPS OR COSTUME PIECES MAY BE USED AS EACH READER TAKES ROLE OF THE FUNNY OLD MAN. FOR EXAMPLE: STRANGE HAT, GLASSES WITH FALSE NOSE, AND WALKING CANE. AS READING BEGINS, PROPS AND COSTUMES ARE UNDER READER 1'S CHAIR. THESE ITEMS WILL BE PASSED FROM READER TO READER AS THE READING PROGRESSES.

SIGNS

LARGE SIGNS WITH THE FOLLOWING WORDS PRINTED UPON THEM WILL ALSO BE NEEDED): SURPRISED, AMAZED, DUMBFOUNDED, BEWILDERED, ASTONISHED, SIDE-BLOTCHED LIZARD, ROUND-TAILED SQUIRREL, TORTOISE/REPTILE, KIT FOX, AND BOBCAT. SIGNS MAY BE GLUED TO HOLDING STICKS, IF DESIRED. THESE WILL BE KEPT ON FLOOR IN FRONT OF APPROPRIATE READERS UNTIL CALLED FOR IN THE SCRIPT.

SEATING/READING ARRANGEMENTS

FACING AUDIENCE, ALL READERS SIT IN A ROW ON STOOLS OR CHAIRS. SCRIPTS ARE HELD IN HANDS, LOW ENOUGH SO THAT FACES ARE EASILY SEEN.

THE NARRATOR STANDS AND THE READING BEGINS:

NARRATOR: Late last Monday

It happened, you see,

A funny old man Shuffled up to me.

(READER 1 PUTS ON HAT AND GLASSES, TAKES CANE. THE FOLLOWING READERS STAND AS THEY READ THEIR INDIVIDUAL

LINES:

READER 2: He pointed his finger

READER 3: And scratched his head.

(READER 1 STANDS AND BEGINS TO SHUFFLE DOWNSTAGE CENTER, PRETENDING TO BE

THE OLD MAN).

READER 4: Then this is what the old man said,

(THE FOLLOWING WORD MUST BE SAID JUST AS IT IS WRITTEN: " EX-CUE-<u>OOOOZ</u>" IS PRONOUNCED AS THREE SYLLABLES.

"OOOOZ" AND "ME" ARE EMPHASIZED.

RHYTHM TO BE USED THROUGHOUT THE STORY WHEN THESE WORDS APPEAR).

REHEARSE THIS BY ESTABLISHING A BEAT OR

ALL: EX-CUE-QOOOZ ME!

(READER 1 POINTS CANE OR WAGS FINGER AT AUDIENCE DURING READING OF FOLLOWING POEM):

READER 1:

Is that your mama

With blotches on her side,

About 5 inches long And not very wide?

She moves pretty fast And I'll tell you too,

That crazy critter looks a lot

(ALL READERS POINT TO AUDIENCE IN UNISON ON "LIKE YOU!").

ALL:

LIKE YOU!

(ALL READERS POINT TO AUDIENCE IN UNISON ON "LIKE YOU!" READER 1 RETURNS TO CHAIR AND PASSES PROPS TO READER 2).

NARRATOR:

As you can well imagine,

I was

(READER 5 PICKS UP SIGN SAYING
"SURPRISED." READER 5 STANDS, HOLDS
SIGN ABOVE HEAD, AND SAYS):

READER 5:

Surprised!

(ALL READERS EXCEPT NARRATOR SIT.

READER 5 PLACES SIGN ON FLOOR).

NARRATOR:

I began to feel

Scales, brownish and gray,

Sprouting on my body

Every which way.

Oh no! I cried.

Then I shook and quivered.

That desert critter is a

ALL:

SIDE-BLOTCHED LIZARD!

(FROM SEATED POSITION, READER 4 HOLDS UP SIGN SAYING "SIDE-BLOTCHED LIZARD" AS ABOVE LINE IS READ. WHEN FINSIHED,

THE SIGN IS RETURNED TO FLOOR).

NARRATOR:

Late last Tuesday

It happened, you see,

A funny old man

Shuffled up to me.

(READER 2 PUTS ON HAT, GLASSES, TAKES CANE. THE FOLLOWING READERS STAND AS THEY READ THEIR INDIVIDUAL LINES).

READER 1:

He pointed his finger

READER 3:

And scratched his head.

(READER 2 STANDS AND SHUFFLES

DOWNSTAGE CENTER, PRETENDING TO BE THE OLD MAN. READER 2 FACES AUDIENCE).

READER 4:

Then this is what the old man said,

(SAME DIRECTIONS AS EARLIER).

ALL:

EX-CUE-OOOOZ ME!

(READER 2 POINTS CANE OR WAGS FINGER

JUST AS READER 1 DID EARLIER)

READER 2:

Is that your papa

Dashing 'cross the trail?

He's a white and sandy color,

With a round skinny tail.

He's heading for his burrow

And I'll tell you, too,
