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The Town With a Very Special Sound

A Readers Theater Script for Primary Readers Teacher Version

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ESTABLISHING THE RHYTHM:

To find the proper rhythm for this Readers Theater poem, first readaloud and clap through the sections as you go. Each **underlined word** or **word** part falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady. Be careful not to read too fast! This is a rehearsal technique and readers will not clap throughout these sections during performance.

FORMATTED FOR 8 READERS:

8 Solo Readers, All Boy Voices, All Girl Voices, and an All Chorus of as many readers as desired.

FLEXIBLE READING PARTS: Depending on the size of your class, you can add more solo readers than the original 8 by assigning additional reader numbers to the unassigned solo lines. (After the first 8 speak once, no reader numbers appear on the script. This is done so you may either continue using the same 8 readers OR create additional parts. Simply pencil in numbers and continue).

HISTORICAL NOTE: The train town in this story is based on a real town: Wellington, Ohio. Eighty to one hundred trains pass through this Ohio town in a 24-hour period, and the residents spend much of their time either waiting to cross train tracks or listening to train sounds. The trains might cause a lot of inconvenience, but they do help make this town a very special place!

PERFORMANCE SUGGESTION: Ask your readers to make the CHORUS of this piece sound as much like a real train as possible. You might do this by asking them to imitate the rhythm of a real train as it chugs along the track. Practice making the "cracks" crackle and the other train sounds sound like they do on a real train!

READER 1: Does a town have a sound,

Its very own sound?

READER 2: A <u>sound</u> that's <u>different</u>

From <u>all</u> the towns a<u>round</u>?

READER 3: We know of a town

That sounds like a hiss,

READER 4: And a <u>chug</u>-a-chug-a <u>clank</u>.

Sounds like this:

GIRLS: Hissssssssssssssssss

BOYS: <u>Chug</u>-a-chug-a <u>clank</u>,

Chuq-a-chug-a clunk.

Hisssssssssssssss

GIRLS: <u>Rat</u>tle, rattle, <u>crank</u>

Rattle, rattle, plunk

ALL: Rickity, Pickity,

Crackity, smack

Choo-choo, woo-woo,

Clickity, Clack!

READER 5: Yes, this town sounds

Just like a train.

READER 6: Sounds like a train

In <u>sun</u>, snow or <u>rain</u>.

READER 7: Sounds like a train

In <u>sum</u>mer, winter, <u>fall</u>.

READER 8: If <u>not</u> for the <u>train</u>,

Would it have a sound at all?

GIRLS: Hissssssssssssssssss

BOYS: <u>Chug</u>-a-chug-a <u>clank</u>,

Chug-a-chug-a clunk.

Hissssssssssssssss (hold through the following

two lines)

GIRLS: <u>Rat</u>tle, rattle, <u>crank</u>

Rattle, rattle, plunk

ALL: Rickity, Pickity,

Crackity, smack

Choo-choo, woo-woo,

Clickity, Clack!

READER 9: Where is this town?

In Locomotive County.

READER 10: When it comes to trains,

This <u>county</u> has a <u>bounty</u>.

READER We call it <u>Train</u>ville

Tiny little town,

READER With a <u>sound</u> that's <u>different</u>

From all the towns around.

GIRLS: Hissssssssssssssssss

BOYS: <u>Chug</u>-a-chug-a <u>clank</u>,

Chug-a-chug-a clunk.

Hisssssssssssssss

GIRLS: Rattle, rattle, crank

Rattle, rattle, plunk

ALL: Rickity, Pickity,

<u>Crack</u>ity, <u>smack</u>

Choo-choo, woo-woo,

Clickity, Clack!

READER Trainville has tracks

On all four sides.

READER So <u>if</u> you're going <u>out</u> of town

You might need a quide.

\READER There are one hundred trains

Each and every day.

READER So if you need to cross the tracks,

You might not find a way.
