# ROMEO & JULIET, In Short by Lee Karvonen

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#### **ESTABLISHING THE RHYTHM**

To find the proper rhythm for this piece, first read-aloud and clap through the sections as you go. Each underlined word or word part falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady. Be careful not to read too fast!

This is a rehearsal technique and readers will not clap throughout these sections during performance. After you have established the beat, it is time to start interpreting, experimenting, and having fun with the words by varying tempo, volume, inflection, and expression. Be careful not to allow the development of a "sing-song" delivery while rehearsing and performing this script.

#### **STAGING**

# This script may be staged as either a Readers Theater Reading or as a Traditional Play:

If you are staging it as RT, hang signs around each characters neck telling the audience the name of that character. (NARRATOR, ROMEO, JULIET, FRIAR LAURENCE, CAPULET, etc.) Since most RT productions do not involve much stage movement, ask your Narrator (and some of the other characters who have smaller parts) to hold up large signs at the proper moments to inform the audience which stage movements are happening at the time. (ASIDE, TAKES JULIET'S HAND, DRINKS THE POISON, etc.).

**NOTE:** If you are staging the piece as Traditional Theater, simply block your actors as you normally would, and follow the stage directions below.

A PAIR OF STAR-CROSSED LOVERS

WILL TEMPT THEIR FAMILIES' RAGE.

TO SEE HOW THIS THING ALL WORKS OUT,

YOU'LL <u>HAVE</u> TO TURN THE <u>PAGE</u>.

THE CAPULETS AND MONTAGUES

HAVE *ISSUES*, IT IS TRUE,

BUT HOW THEY'RE GOING TO WORK THEM OUT

WILL TURN THEM REALLY BLUE.

PULL UP A CHAIR AND HAVE AN EAR,

THEIR STORY FOR TO LEARN.

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#### **SCENE ONE**

SAMPSON: TODAY I'M SPOILING FOR A FIGHT;

LET'S FIND A MONTAGUE.

MY <u>BLADE</u> IS ITCHY <u>IN</u> MY HAND; I'D LIKE TO RUN ONE THROUGH.

GREGORY: THEN SET YOURSELF; HERE COME A PAIR,

SO WE CAN START A FIGHT.

LET'S QUARREL FOR OUR MASTERS' SAKE;

WE KNOW WE'RE IN THE RIGHT!

SAMPSON: HEY <u>AB</u>RAHAM, YOU <u>WEAK</u> OLD MAN,

OUR MASTER IS THE BEST,

SO <u>NOW</u> PUT UP OR <u>SHUT</u> UP; HEY, MAN, THIS IS THE TEST.

ABRAHAM: I SEEK NO QUARREL WITH YOU, SIR.

SO, PLEASE, JUST LET ME PASS.

SAMPSON: WELL, SIR, I BITE MY THUMB AT YOU.

YOU CANNOT LET THAT PASS!

ABRAHAM: I <u>SERVE</u> A MAN AS <u>GOOD</u> AS YOURS.

GREGORY: NO BETTER, DO YOU SAY?

I BEG YOU ALL TO STOP!

THIS QUARREL HAS GONE FAR TOO FAR;

IT'S WAY OVER THE TOP!

TYBALT: BEN<u>VO</u>LIO, YOU <u>TALK</u> OF PEACE

AND YET YOUR BLADE IS DRAWN,

I HATE THE WORD, AND MONTAGUES,

AND HELL - LET'S GET IT ON!

NARRATOR: THE PRINCE WAS CALLED TO BREAK IT UP

AND HE WAS IN A RAGE.

HE WAS, FOR CERTAIN, ALL FED UP

WITH QUARRELS AT THIS STAGE.

PRINCE: HEY <u>CAP</u>ULET! HEY <u>MONT</u>AGUE!

YOU ENEMIES OF PEACE!

TODAY BECOMES THE FINAL STRAW!

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YOUR QUARREL NOW MUST <u>CEASE!</u>
IF <u>YOU</u> PERSIST NOW, <u>EITHER</u> ONE,
YOUR <u>LIVES</u> WILL PAY THE <u>PRICE!</u>
NOT ANOTHER <u>CIV</u>IL BRAWL!

THERE'S NO MORE MISTER NICE!

### **SCENE TWO**

LADY MONTAGUE: BEN<u>VO</u>LIO, I <u>ASK</u> YOU PLAIN,

HAVE YOU SEEN ROMEO?

I WORRY THAT HE IS SO SAD

AND BLUE AND DOWN AND LOW.

BENVOLIO: HE WANDERS THROUGH THE STREETS AT DAWN

AND <u>MOANS</u> A MIGHTY <u>SIGH</u>, HE SOUNDS AS IF IT'S FATAL

AND THAT <u>SOON</u> HE'S GOING TO <u>DIE</u>. I'LL <u>SEEK</u> HIM OUT AND <u>TRY</u> TO LEARN
